The Bill Wilson Center helped one woman get her life with her two boys back on track

SAN JOSE — Jessica remembers her breaking point like it happened yesterday.

It wasn't when the man she loved punched her in the face and knocked her to the ground as the kids slept in the next room. It wasn't when he dragged her across the carpet by her hair. And it wasn't when he obsessively checked her phone or demanded she stop seeing her male friends.

The breaking point was when he got a permit to carry a gun. That's when Jessica, who already slept with a knife under her pillow, truly feared for her life.

"Once he got a gun, I was under here," Jessica said, tapping the bottom of her tennis shoe. "I knew my kids couldn't lose me."

Jessica, whose real name this newspaper isn't using to protect her anonymity, endured a decade of emotional and physical abuse.
